Cultural Property Legislation in Australia

- The export of Australia's significant cultural heritage objects is regulated under the *Protection of Movable Cultural Heritage Act 1986* (PMCH ACT).
- The PMCH Act is designed to strike a balance between the protection of cultural heritage without unduly interfering in legitimate trade.
- It does not affect an individual's right to own or sell these objects within Australia.
- The PMCH Act implements a system of export permits for certain heritage objects defined as Class B 'Australian protected objects'.

What the PMCH Act protects

Class A objects - prohibited from export


- Some of the most significant objects of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander heritage:
- Bark and log coffins
- Human remains
- Rock art
- Dendroglyphs (carved burial and initiation trees)
- Sacred and secret ritual objects
- Victoria Crosses awarded to named recipients

What the PMCH Act protects

Class B objects - may be exported if granted a Cultural Heritage Control List. These are based on criteria set out in the National permit or certificate under the PMCH Act.



Permit System

Permit Applications
